## Board Meeting Update

*Please note that the Board Recap included in this newsletter is intended to provide a brief summary of selected topics discussed at the meeting and does not constitute the official meeting minutes. Homeowners may review the approved Board Meeting Minutes on the Association website at [fsbhoa.com](http://fsbhoa.com) by selecting "Our HOA" from the top menu and then clicking "Board Meetings."*

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The Board of Directors General Session meeting was held on Wednesday, May 27, 2026. The following are highlights of items discussed and actions taken during the meeting.

The Board discussed homeowner comments regarding the recently purchased pool lift. During the discussion, it was clarified that the Association is a private facility and that the purchase was not related to ADA compliance, but rather to support reasonable accommodations, resident safety, and to help reduce potential liability exposure for the Association.

The Board reviewed homeowner comments regarding pool maintenance scheduling and vendor attendance. Management explained that the pool vendor services the community on a regular weekly schedule, with additional summer service days, and noted that occasional delays may occur due to route or service-related issues. Management further reported that vendor performance is monitored and that overall pool cleanliness and service have remained significantly improved under the current provider.

The Board reviewed homeowner correspondence regarding the Association's administrative communication procedure. Following discussion, the Board expressed its support for Management's current process, noting that the procedure is intended to promote consistency, organization, documentation, and efficient use of Association resources and staff time. The Board further stated that it considers the process administrative in nature and intended to be applied uniformly throughout the community.

### Executive Session Summary:

Secretary, Skip Welchans, reported that the Board met in Executive Session on April 22, 2026, and a Special Executive Session on April 9, 2026. The following actions were disclosed to the Membership:

**Violations & Hearings:** The Board reviewed 70 Rule Violations and 7 Architectural Violations and conducted 3 hearings.

**Contracts:** The Board approved a contract with BrightView Landscape in the amount of \$5,777.61 for irrigation reconfiguration and conversion to a drip line system along the hedges in the botanical garden area to help eliminate overspray from the existing irrigation.

## Board Update - cont.

### Management Report:

- The Facilities Committee continues reviewing options for improvements at the South Entrance fountain area, including possible planter enhancements or decorative screening features. Management is currently obtaining pricing for the concepts discussed.
- The Devanti's Video Alarm project for the pool area is currently on hold pending resolution of a contractual matter.
- Management reported that quorum has already been reached for the upcoming Board Election and expressed appreciation to homeowners for their strong and timely participation this year.
- Management reported that ongoing soil testing continues to assist in monitoring the effectiveness of landscape fertigation and irrigation efforts throughout the community.
- Construction and repair work at the Lodge and Pool Cabana is approximately halfway complete. Current work includes stucco repairs, restroom grout replacement, and fascia repairs, with additional pool deck and entrance repairs still pending scheduling.
- The final common area bench installation is expected to be completed soon, including repositioning of the bench to improve the view and seating orientation for residents.

### Treasurer's Report:

The Board approved and ratified the April 30, 2026 financial statements and reconciled bank statements, subject to the year-end CPA audit. The Board also approved the filing of delinquent assessment liens as part of the Association's standard collection procedures.

### Committee Reports and Board Actions:

#### *Facilities Committee:*

The Board approved a proposal for touch-up painting throughout the Lodge, including the Ballroom, Café, hallways, Library, and Gym, utilizing reserve funds allocated for Lodge interior maintenance.

#### *Architectural Review Committee (ARC):*

The Architectural Review Committee reported that two architectural applications and four notices of completion were reviewed and approved during the reporting period.

The committee continues reviewing the Architectural Standards and Procedures, including possible updates related to homeowner replacement projects such as windows, doors, garage doors, and roofs.

The committee is also reviewing potential future standards related to solar installation concerns not currently addressed within the existing guidelines.

## Board Update - cont.

### *Social Committee:*

The Social Committee reported that the recent Paint Night event was well attended, with 22 residents participating. The committee shared that the event was a success and enjoyed by those in attendance.

The committee also announced that its final event of the committee year will be the upcoming Wine Trip. Residents interested in attending are reminded that registration closes on June 12, 2026.

### *Landscape Committee:*

The Landscape Committee provided the Board with irrigation data related to Controller O, which services landscape areas located on Stockholm, Shelburne, Toscana, and Torin, as part of ongoing discussions regarding irrigation efficiency improvements. The committee is exploring a potential future project involving adjustments to watering schedules and the possible use of rotary sprinklers in certain areas to help improve landscape conditions and reduce water usage. Management was also tasked with researching potential rebate opportunities related to sprinkler head replacements.

### *IT / Website Committee:*

The IT/Website Committee reported that the new microphones have been installed and that several older microphones have been listed for sale. Additional outdated equipment that could not legally be resold was properly disposed of.

The committee also reported that repairs were completed to the east-side north pedestrian gate striker, restoring the gate to normal operation. Work continues on a new calendar program for the Association website, which is expected to improve efficiency and reduce certain administrative tasks once implemented.

The committee also continues exploring potential options for expanded camera coverage within the parking lot areas.

### *Non-Functional Turf Compliance Committee:*

The committee reported that it is awaiting additional information from Cal Water regarding potential turf replacement rebate programs expected to be announced following the start of the new budget year on July 1.

Planning has begun for the next phase of turf conversion projects within the Lodge grounds, with approximately 40,000 square feet currently identified for potential conversion. The committee has also identified additional future conversion areas and continues to evaluate Kurapia as the preferred replacement material.

### Proposed Rule Changes:

The Board reviewed homeowner comments submitted during the 28-day member comment period regarding several proposed rule changes.

## Board Update - cont.

Following discussion, the Board adopted revisions to portions of the Architectural Standards and Procedures, Pool and Spa Area Rules, and the Internal Dispute Resolution (IDR) procedures, with the changes becoming effective immediately.

The Board also determined that additional revisions were needed for the proposed Surveillance Camera Monitoring of Common Areas rule changes and referred the item back to the Rules and Regulations Committee for further review and rewording.

In addition, the Board directed the Rules and Regulations Committee to develop a form intended to assist homeowners when submitting Internal Dispute Resolution (IDR) requests.

### Association Golf Cart Replacement:

The Board approved the purchase of a replacement Management golf cart due to the declining condition of the existing vehicle. The newly approved cart was available at a reduced price that aligned with the amount allocated within the Association's reserve study. The Board also authorized Management to sell the existing golf cart, with proceeds to be returned to reserves.

### Next Meeting:

The next regular Board of Directors General Session meeting is scheduled for June 24, 2026 at 6:00 p.m. The Annual Meeting/Board Election will be held on June 10, 2026 at 6 p.m.

## **Neighborly Reminder - Sharing Our Community Spaces**

A friendly reminder to help keep our community safe and enjoyable for everyone.

Many residents use the sidewalks, Paseo, and Lodge outdoor common areas for walking, exercising, visiting with neighbors, and enjoying the outdoors. To help protect the safety and comfort of all residents, bicycles, skateboards, scooters, rollerblades, and other wheeled items should not be ridden within the Lodge Outdoor Common Areas, including the Paseo and surrounding walkways, except for medically necessary equipment, as outlined in Section 4.03 of the Rules and Regulations Community Handbook.

In addition, Section 2.06(e) reminds us that any guest using bicycles, tricycles, skateboards, skates, rollerblades, or similar wheeled items within the Association must be accompanied by a Member or Resident at all times, and pedestrians always have the right of way.

A little courtesy and awareness go a long way. By slowing down, yielding to walkers, and respecting shared spaces, we help create a safer and more welcoming environment for everyone who calls Four Seasons home.

Thank you for doing your part to help maintain the friendly, respectful, and neighborly atmosphere that makes our community so special.

# Architectural Review Committee (ARC)

First, a word about the purpose of the Architectural Review Committee. As stated in the adopted Committee Charter, the Committee is “to complete fair and consistent reviews of exterior improvements or modifications to ensure that improvements adhere to established standards and procedures and maintain the continuity of the community.” To that end, the HOA Board appoints the five-person committee, including the chairperson, to conduct the “fair and consistent” review of proposed projects. I believe the community is fortunate to have the current group of dedicated committee members who collectively possess decades of experience in various aspects of design, construction, and style.

Next, a few words about homeowner maintenance. Homeowners are responsible for maintaining any portion of their residence that is visible from the Common Area. No part of a home visible from the Common Area should be allowed to fall into disrepair. Examples include chipped or peeling paint, cracked or broken windows, torn window screens, or overgrown landscaping, to name a few. In short, our community standards require that each portion of a residence visible from the Common Area be maintained in good condition by, and at the sole expense of, the homeowner. This helps uphold our community standards and contributes to the lasting value of Four Seasons at Bakersfield.

Finally, a few words about appeals of ARC decisions. Under the Architectural Standards and Procedures of Four Seasons HOA, decisions of the ARC are final. If a homeowner disagrees with an ARC decision, they may submit an appeal to the HOA Board. The Board shall hear the appeal at the next scheduled Board meeting, provided the meeting is at least 10 business days after the appeal filing date. The decision of the Board shall be final. The ARC must “stay on its toes” during the review of projects, as there is a 30-day review period for applications to be approved or denied.



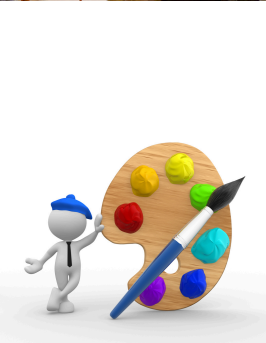
# Social Committee Sherry Davis, Chairperson

# The Fairfax Grange and Bertha Rankin, Part 1

Located on the northeast corner of Fairfax Road and Brundage Lane is a historic building that was erected more than ninety years ago. It is the home of Grange 570, more commonly known as the Fairfax Grange.



Originally, Kern County had six Grange chapters, but the Fairfax Grange is the only one to survive. Currently, despite its need for some much-needed repairs, it remains an active venue. The hall was built in 1943, nine years after the local organization was established. Together with the Weedpatch Grange, it

once served as a gathering place for Dust Bowl migrants.

According to *nationalgrange.org*: “The Grange is a family, community organization with its roots in agriculture. Founded in 1867, the Grange was formed as a national organization with a local focus. Our members are given the opportunity to learn and grow to their full potential as citizens and leaders.

“The family is the base of the organization with full membership beginning at age 14. Women have been equal members since the inception of the Grange. We have a Junior Grange program for children age 5 to 14 that has helped the youngest members of the family learn about community values and citizenship for more than 100 years.”

Late local historian William Harland Boyd recorded the following Kern County Grange membership information in the January 3, 1874, issue of the Kern County Courier:

## The Fairfax Grange and Bertha Rankin, Part 1 - cont.

Initially known as the Patrons of Husbandry, Granges are America's oldest national agricultural organization. Founded by Oliver Hudson Kelley and a group of his colleagues from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, their goal was to advocate for the interests of farmers. One example of this support occurred during the mid-nineteenth century, when railroads and grain elevators charged farmers excessive fees to transport and store their produce.

As a result, in 1877, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled against the railroads, declaring that the "right of a state to regulate a business that is public in nature, though privately owned and managed," was justified. Even though many early Grange laws have, over time, been reversed, their principles have endured.

According to the Minnesota Historical Society, "Over the years, members fought for many issues, including railroad regulation, farmland reform, and universal suffrage." The National Grange continues to survive today, consisting of approximately 2,000 local community Granges across 41 states and nearly 80,000 members.

In recent years, attendance at Grange social gatherings has dwindled. The Fairfax building has fallen into disrepair and is in need of roof restoration and other exterior refurbishments. According to John Harrer, the current Grange Master, "Lately, Fairfax Grange has again been enjoying country music and dancing on 'the best dance floor in town!'"

# Resident Awareness: Cleaning Your Refrigerator Condenser Coils - Potential Damage Caused by Dust Buildup on Refrigerator Condenser Coils

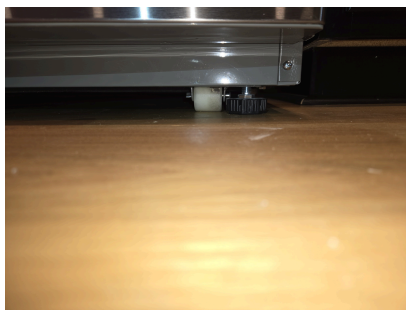
As the weather warms up, refrigerator condenser coils must work harder to keep appliances cool. Over time, dust buildup on the coils can reduce efficiency and potentially lead to compressor failure.

Note:

Newer refrigerator condenser coils are more compact. A prolonged layer of dust can significantly insulate these coils, forcing the compressor to run longer and hotter than intended.

Preventive Maintenance Steps:

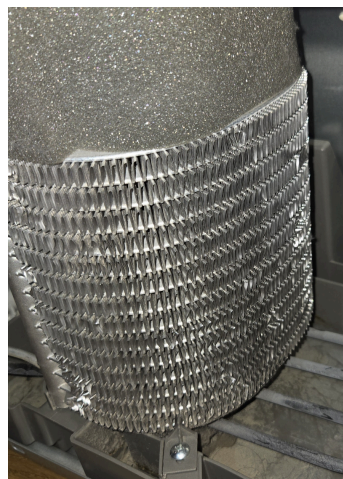
- Raise or loosen (turn left) the front stabilizers, commonly used on most three-door units (see Picture 1).
- The stabilizers help prevent movement when opening the lower drawer.
- Carefully pull the refrigerator away from the wall and unplug it.
- Use caution with the attached water line, if applicable.
- Remove the lower rear panel cover (typically secured with four to six screws).
- Gently vacuum the condenser coils to remove dust and debris (see Picture 2).
- Inspect the cleaned condenser coils (see Pictures 3 and 4).
- Reinstall the lower rear panel cover, again using caution around the water line.
- Plug the refrigerator back in.
- Carefully slide the refrigerator back into place and lower the front stabilizers, if applicable.

### Wine Fun Facts

- The oldest known winery dates back more than 6,000 years and was discovered in Armenia.
- A standard bottle of wine contains about 49 glasses-worth of grapes.
- Wine grapes are different from table grapes — they are smaller, sweeter, and contain seeds.
- Swirling wine in a glass helps release its aromas by increasing oxygen exposure.
- Oak barrels can add flavors like vanilla, caramel, spice, or smoke to wine.
- The color of wine comes primarily from the grape skins, not the juice.
- Some vineyards play music for their vines, believing vibrations may help growth.
- The term “toast” comes from ancient Rome, when toasted bread was placed in wine to improve flavor.

### Water Marbling Fun Facts

- Water marbling, also called paper marbling, dates back more than 1,000 years.
- The art form originated in parts of Japan and later spread through Turkey and Europe.
- Traditional Japanese marbling is known as Suminagashi, meaning “floating ink.”
- Every marbled design is one of a kind — no two patterns are ever exactly the same.
- Artists create patterns by floating paint on thickened water before transferring the design onto paper or other surfaces.
- Water marbling has been used to decorate book covers, stationery, fabric, and even guitars.
- Some modern nail art techniques are inspired by traditional water marbling methods.
- The relaxing swirling motions used in marbling are often considered calming and meditative.

By the way, I've noticed some of our babies are leaving little surprises on the sidewalks and grass. As their parent(s), please clean up after your pet!

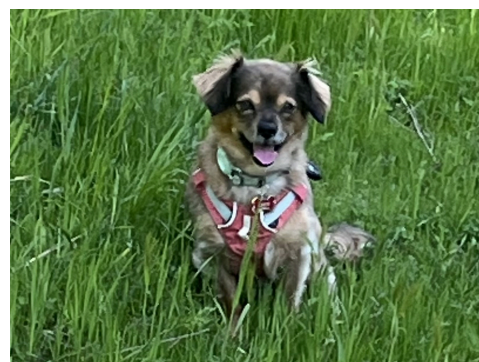

Margaret’s distinguished career in mathematics education began in 1971 with the Kern High School District after earning her bachelor’s degree in mathematics from California State University, Fullerton. She later earned a master’s degree in curriculum and instruction from California State University, Bakersfield. Over the course of 26 years, she taught all levels of mathematics at both Highland High School and East Bakersfield High School, inspiring generations of students through her passion for learning and dedication to excellence.

Beyond the classroom, Margaret made a lasting impact on mathematics education throughout California. She served as co-director of the San Joaquin Valley Mathematics Project, co-directed the Interactive Mathematics Program, and supported educators locally as a mathematics resource teacher for KHSD. Her leadership extended statewide as president of the California Mathematics Council and through her involvement in numerous educational initiatives.

Margaret also dedicated countless hours to student activities and community service. In retirement, she continued advocating for foster youth as a Court Appointed Special Advocate and volunteering throughout the community. In recognition of her dedication to service, she received the 2019 Westchester Kiwanis Community Service Award. The organization described Margaret as someone who “spends countless hours volunteering her time,” and expressed deep appreciation for her unwavering commitment to helping others.

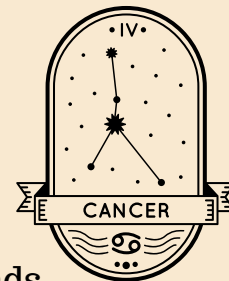
